What are Disability Policies?



Disability policies are public policies guiding commitment, decisions, and actions that impact people with disabilities.



Accessible Canada Act (ACA, 2019)



Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA, 1990)

They highlight how disability is perceived in society and a government's commitment towards citizens with disabilities.

Transport Policies Concern Different Government Levels

Federal	Provides general requirements that have authority over all states and localities
	Covers projects with federal funding and transportation servicesIncludes trains and ferries
State/Provincial	Regulates public transit agencies for operation within state borders • Covers services for daily commutes, such as buses, subways, and paratransit
Municipal	Covers tariffs and city-wide transport services, such as taxis and ride- sharing
